## More Food Needed for Emergency Services Program

In 2012, MCUM received 72,371 pounds of donated food, hygiene products, and cleaning items. This was 12% less than in 2011. However, at a time when we are trying to expand the amount of food we provide to each household from a three-day supply of food to a five-day supply of food, more donations are needed. A successful "Each One, Feed One" Community Food Drive can help to stock our shelves but the pantry also need more ongoing food drives and larger food donations. ## Food Pantry Needs

The pantry welcomes donations of all non-perishable foods, but we currently have a special need for:

- canned meats - sausage, beef stew, salmon
- baking mixes
- canned vegetables - potatoes, mixed vegetables
- canned fruit - pears, oranges
- peanut butter

Meat for our freezer is also welcome, including:

- 1-2 pound packages of meat (can be re-wrapped at deli counter into small packages)
- whole chickens

## Cleaning Closet Needs

Cleaning supplies and hygiene products can't be purchased with food stamps and are in high demand. Help restock our shelves with:

- bleach
- toothbrushes & paste
- floor cleaners
- socks and underwear for adults
- razors and shaving cream
- baby wash and shampoo

## Childcare Needs

With 84 children enrolled, the Childcare Program needs all kinds of supplies, including:

- Scrabble letter tiles
- two-pocket folders, without fasteners
- non-toxic dry erase markers
- school supply boxes, approx. 6" x 8"
- clipboards (9" x 12")
- Crayola crayons, 24 packs
- Crayola washable markers, 8 packs

# Childcare Curriculum Changes



Over the past several months, the Childcare Program teachers have been working diligently on creating a new and improved curriculum. This is part of our efforts to provide continuity between what is taught here and what is taught in elementary school. The most significant changes we've been making are based on the Common Core Standards for Kindergarten. The Dolphin Class (the 5- and 6-year-olds) will follow these standards. For the other classrooms, each standard is scaled down based on the children's ages. For example, the Dolphins will learn to count to 100,

the Otters (the 4-year-olds) will learn to count to 50, and the Seahorses (the 2.5 to 3-year-olds) will learn to count to 10. The goal of this new curriculum is to systematically move all children in the direction of school readiness, regardless of age.

We have made modifications to our routine as well, incorporating a separate "free play" time, with broad choices of activities, to compliment a new "mini-lesson and rotation" learning time, which provides structured team and large group activities. Additionally, the weekly themes you could have read about in this newsletter have been expanded to monthly themes that will include special school-wide events, allow for deeper exploration of topics, and use favorite classroom topics to inspire learning in new areas - it's more fun to count to 100 when counting dinosaurs!

In the Otter (Pre-K) and Dolphin (Kindergarten and Pre-K) Classrooms, math and literacy boxes will encourage teamwork in activities such as graphing and reading. This month we will celebrate National Friendship Week, August 12-16, as well as host MCUM's first annual Comedy Show on August 16 in celebration of National Tell-a-Joke Day!

Our teachers are excited to get the school year underway but could use some help in gathering specific supplies. Check out the wish list below and help us launch our new curriculum with all the necessities!
