Childcare Program: NAEYC Family Survey Results

Earlier this year, MCUM achieved the highest-ever response rate on its annual NAEYC Family Survey, with nearly 80 percent of surveys returned! National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC) surveys are distributed to childcare families annually each spring. Results of this year's survey were particularly important, as they supported MCUM's application for reaccreditation with NAEYC. To meet reaccreditation criteria, each question must receive favorable responses from at least 75 percent of parents completing the survey. This year, more than 90 percent of applicable survey questions received favorable responses!

Only two applicable questions fell short of the criteria. MCUM will continue to expand opportunities for families to get to know and support each other (71 percent of respondents felt there were currently enough opportunities) and to have parent-teacher conversations regarding the language used to teach each child (67 percent of parents felt this occurred).

Student Spotlight

As the school year begins, we welcome a number of students to the MCUM family. In addition to our treasured volunteers (including service-learners), we are pleased to welcome three longer-term fellows and interns:

Sidney Harris, a first-year student at Indiana University, will provide critical connections between MCUM volunteer opportunities and students at IU as our Advocate for Community Engagement (ACE). Sidney says, "I enjoy working at MCUM because they help to solve some of the major issues in the Bloomington community. I am very passionate about issues of social justice and I believe that everyone should have the opportunity to rise above the trappings of poverty. So working at MCUM affords me the chance to interact with members of the Bloomington community and work with them on an individual level hopefully making a positive impact."

Tessa Skidmore, graduate student at the School of Public and Environmental Affairs at IU, is a Service Corps Fellow supporting MCUM's development efforts. Tessa says of her involvement, "I'm so grateful for the opportunity to enhance my classroom education by working with a local non-profit. Being placed with MCUM is exciting because, with its childcare facility and food pantry on site, I am able to see the direct impact on community members in need. I'm eager to help the development team in promoting MCUM's mission and further develop the resources necessary to achieve it."

Kiana (Ki) Werner, a senior at IU, has been working closely with MCUM's Emergency Services caseworkers. Ki says, "I'm interning at MCUM for my social work senior practicum this year, and I couldn't be more thankful for the opportunity. I've already learned so much here that will help me in my future career, and every day brings new experiences."

We are thrilled to have each of these individuals placed with us, and we look forward to seeing all they accomplish, both at MCUM and at IU!

Seahorses

The Seahorses will learn about fall fest as well as the different aspects of the autumn season. The children will read books, such as *Going on a Leaf Hunt* and *Fall is for Friends*, and will be doing many different activities that relate to fall and October.

Going on a Leaf Hunt is a "big" book about searching for and studying leaves from all types of trees. It is a fun and interactive way to engage the children and show them fall leaf colors. *Fall is for Friends* is about two friends who want to play in piles of leaves, but the leaves won't fall. They try to think of ways to make them fall, but mom tells them they must fall on their own. It's neat to watch the children come up with their own versions of how leaves fall.

The Seahorses will also color leaves, make their own fall leaves book, and do leaf rubbings with stencils. The children like to color their own pictures, but they will be challenged to line up the stencil with the paper. The children will also paint with red, orange, yellow, green, and brown to create their own fall scenes.

After we read our books and do various activities, we will learn new fall songs, including *Ten Little Apples* and *5 Little Pumpkins Sitting on a Gate* for Halloween. The children love to sing but may not be familiar with these songs, so it will be fun to watch!

Of course, we will continue learning our shapes, colors, and the alphabet through songs and activities that help develop social, language, and math skills.

Penguins

The Penguins will talk about the fall harvest this month. We will read *Welcome Fall* and *Let It Fall*, then talk about what we think fall is. We will also read *Apple Picking Time* and talk about different kinds of apples. The Penguins will taste a lot of apples and talk about their favorite kinds. They will paint with, count and sort apples, too. Which apples are the biggest? Which ones are green, yellow, red or even pink?

The next book we will read is *Pooh's Harvest*. We will talk about what the pictures look like and if we think the text matches them. The Penguins will also discuss who the author and illustrator are.

Then we will read *Let's Go On a Leaf Hunt* and *The Leaves Fall All Around*. The Penguins love to go on a bear hunt – will they love to go on a leaf hunt as well? We will collect leaves and make leaf collages and rubbings. While reading these books, we will also pick out the letters we are learning from the text. We will continue practicing our letters and make our own leaf books.

Last but not least – pumpkins! What is on the inside of a pumpkin? The Penguins will carve one and taste the seeds. We will talk about all the things you can do with a pumpkin and even try pumpkin roll. We will read *Sixteen Runaway Pumpkins* and *Five Little Pumpkins*. The Penguins will also learn the five little pumpkins song and see how their bodies can roll.

Then, of course, what is fall without our imaginations? At the end of the month, the Penguins will have a costume party and a parade.

Otters

This month, the Otters will talk about the fall harvest. We will read fall-related books, listen to fall stories, and discuss changes that take place during this season. To go along with our theme, the Otters will also learn about pumpkins and apples. At the end of October, we will dress up in costumes and have a Halloween parade through the preschool and main building!

As we discuss the changes that occur during the fall, we will take a nature walk around the block to observe the leaves, trees, and any other differences we notice. We will also collect items from our walk to bring back to the classroom and study in the science area. In the art area, we will make leaf rubbings, paint with reds, oranges, and yellows, and do other fall-related projects.

The Otters will talk about how, where and when apples grow. We will learn the names for various apples, discuss the different colors of apples, paint with apples, and even have our very own apple tasting party! During the tasting party, the Otters will have the opportunity to sample different types of apples, as well as both apple juice and cider, and then share which was their favorite. Then we'll graph our results to find out which was most popular!

Throughout the month, we will continue working on our sight words, learning the letters of the alphabet, recognizing numbers, and writing our names. As October comes to a close, we will have a huge Halloween party!

Dolphins

October is a month in which many changes occur. The weather begins to get colder and the sun sets at an earlier time.

We will talk about our health and how the cold weather makes it easier for viruses to thrive. We will practice good hygiene by washing our hands to decrease the chances of getting sick.

This month, we will cover various topics related to safety. The Dolphins will learn how to prevent fires, what to do if our home catches on fire, as well as the stop, drop, and roll technique.

We will talk about Halloween and the safety concerns involved with playing outside. We will also learn why rules are essential, and who our community's safety providers are. The Dolphins are looking forward to a visit from a police officer and firefighter.
